ORDINANCE NO. 59

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 12-A, SERIES OF 1965, REQUIRING ANNUAL PERMIT AND INSPECTION OF ALL TRADES, OCCUPATIONS, BUSINESSES AND POSSESSION OF ARTICLES, PRESCRIBING FEES THEREFOR, PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Municipal Board of Ormoc City, That:

CHAPTER I

MAYOR'S PERMIT

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or entity to conduct or engage in any business, trade, occupation and possession of articles and things as herein required to be allowed without first securing a permit from the City Mayor.

SECTION 2. There shall be paid to the City Treasurer for every permit issued by the City Mayor for business, trade, occupation and possession of any article and thing as hereinbelow enumerated with the following schedules:

- 34. "Restaurants" shall include all establishments where the public may procure, for a price, meals consisting of native and/or foreign dishes including regreshments, beverages and liquors.
- 35. "Cafe" and "cafeteria" are synonymous and interchange able terms and shall include establishments where the public may be served, for a price, beverages and all kinds of foodstuffs under the catergory of refreshments, but not including liquors.
- 36. "Refreshment parlor" shall include establishments offering to the public, for a price, all kinds of soft drinks, ice cream and similar products, cakes, 'halo-halo', assorted cookies or biscuits, 'agar-agar' and 'gulaman'.
- 37. "Carenderia" shall include all establishments serving or offering to the public, for a price, meals consisting in the main native or Filipino dishes.
- 38. "Panciteria" shall include all establishments serving or offering to the public, for a price, meals, consisting in the main 'pansit' and other Chinese dishes together with liquor as the customer may order.
- 39. "Food contractor" means one who contracts to furnish banquets and other gatherings with meals and who has no establishment of his own for serving or selling such meals but instead serves or furnishes the meals at the place of his customers.
- 40. "Food caterer" means one who caters to individuals usually in dinner pails (fiambreras) and who has no establishment of his own for serving meals but instead takes them to the place of his customers.
- 41. "Peddler" means any person who either for himself or on commission travels from place to place or town to town and sells his goods or offers to sell and deliver the same.
- 42. "Real estate dealer" includes any person engaged in the business of buying, selling, exchanging, leasing or renting real estate property as principal and holding himself out as a full or part time dealer in real estate or as owner of property or properties rented or offered for rent. Any person shall be considered as engaged in business as real estate dealer by the mere fact that he is the owner or sublessor of property rented or offered for rent.
- 43. "Real estate broker" includes any person other than a real estate salesman as hereinafter defined, who for another, and for a compensation or in the expectation or promise of receiving compensation:
 - (1) sells or offers for sale, buys or offers to buy, lists, or solicits for prospective purchasers or negotiates the purchase, sale or exchange of real estate or interests therein;
 - (2) negotiates loans on real estate;
 - (3) or leases or offers to lease or negotiates the sale, purchase or exchange of the lease, or rents or places for rent or collects rent from real estate improvements thereof;



(4) or shall be employed by or in behalf of the owner or owners of lots or other parcels of real estate at a stated salary, on commissions, or otherwise, to sell such real estate or any part thereof in lots or parcels.

440 meal estate salesman" means any natural person regularly employed by a real estate broker to perform in behalf of such broker any or all of the functions of a real estate broker. One act of a character embraced within the above definition shall constitute the person performing or attempting to perform the same as a real eatate broker. But the foreseing definitions do not include a person who shall directly perform any of the acts aforesaid with reference to his own property, where such acts are performed in the regular course of or as incident to the management of such property; nor shall they apply to persons acting pursuant to a duly executed power of attorney from the owner authorizing final consumption by performance of a contract conveying real estate by sale, mertgage or lease; nor shall they apply to any receive er, trustee or assignee bankruptcy or inscluency, or to any person acting pursuant to the order of any courts nor to a trustee selling under a deed of trusto

45. "Commercial broker" includes all persons, other than importers, manufacturers, producers, or bena fide employees, who for compensation or profit, sell or bring about sales or purchases of merchandise for other persons, or bring proposed buyers and sellers together, or negotiate freights or other business for owners of vessels, or other means of transportation, or for the shippers or consignors or consignees of freight carried by vessels or other means of transportation. The term includes commission merchants.

46. "Lending investors" includes all persons who make a practice of lending money for themselves or others at interest.

CHAPTER III

GEVERAL PROVISIONS

SECTION 4. VISITORIAL POWERS. - For the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this Ordinance, the City Treasurer or any of his deputies specifically authorized in writing shall have authority to investigate or inspect any person or establishment subject to the payment of Mayor's permit fee, provided such investigation or inspection shall only be made during regular business hours unless the person or entity concerned shall consent otherwise.

SECTION 5. DELEGATION OF POWERS. - For the proper imelementation and enforcement of this Ordinance, the City
Treasurer, with the approval of the Mayor, may from time to
time issue reasonable rules and regulations as may be necessary, consistent with the provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 6. PENALTY CLAUSE. - Any violation of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punishable upon conviction by a fine of not more than two hundred pesos (P2CO.CO) or an imprisonment of not exceeding six (6) months, or both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.

In case the penalty imposed is a fine, non-payment thereof by the person convicted shall subject him to a

subsidiary imprisonment computed at two peecs and fifty centaves (P2.50) for each day of imprisonment, with probibition from further operation of his trade, business or occupations

In the case of firms, associations, partnerships, companies or corporations, the manager or the person charged with the management of such entities shall be criminally liable.

SECTION 7. REPEALING CLAUSE. - Any ordinance or part of ordinances which is inconsistent with the provisions hereof is hereby repealed and declared null and void.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVITY. - This Ordinance shall take effect on January 1, 1971.
