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
RESOLUTION NO. 2022-023

**A RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE ORMOC CITY YOUTH
DEVELOPMENT PLAN 2022-2024 AND INTEGRATING
THE SAME TO THE CURRENT CITY DEVELOPMENT
PLAN**

WHEREAS, this Sanggunian was in receipt of a first endorsement dated August 4, 2021 from Acting City Mayor Leo Carmelo L. Locsin Jr. requesting for the issuance of a resolution and/or enactment of an ordinance for the adoption of the City Youth Development Plan (CYDP) 2022-2024 and said endorsement being certified as urgent;

WHEREAS, Section 8 (a) Republic Act 10742 of SK Reform Act of 2015 provides that "in consultation and with the concurrence of the Katipunanng Kabataan, and within three (3) months from assumption to office, formulate a three (3) year rolling plan, which shall be known as the Comprehensive Barangay Youth Development Plan, which shall serve as basis in the preparation of the Annual Barangay Youth Investment Program. This plan shall be aligned with the Philippine Youth Development Plan (PYDP) and other Local Youth Development Plans in every level, municipal, city and provincial as is relevant";

WHEREAS, DILG Memorandum Circular No. 2019-151 provides that SK Officials including Youth Development Officers at all levels are enjoined to observe the guidelines, processes and indicative timelines in preparation of their respective Youth Development Plans;



WHEREAS, Section 10 of Ormoc City Youth Ordinance (Ord. No. 015, S. 2016) states that the CYDP shall be initially drafted by the SK Pederasyon and shall be finalized by the CYDC. This shall be submitted to the Youth Advisory Council for endorsement to the City Mayor and for inclusion in the Local Development Plan and subsequently endorsed to the Sangguniang Panlungsod for approval;

WHEREAS, the Ormoc City Youth Development Plan or City Youth Development Plan (CYDP) is the definitive output of the City Youth Parliament, CYDP Workshop, and consultation and validation of the collaborative efforts of the registered youth organizations, SK Federation, City Youth Development Council, copy of the said plan is hereto attached as Annex "A" and made an integral part hereof;

WHEREAS, the abovestated plan was finally recommended by SK Federation of Ormoc, City Youth Development Council and City Youth Advisory Council on their respective resolution citing the said plan, copy of the said resolutions are hereto attached as Annexes "B" and "C" and made an integral part thereof;

WHEREAS, during the Committee Meeting conducted last August 27, 2021, the body recommended that the said plan is in compliance with law;

WHEREAS, this body finds it meritorious to pass a resolution for the adoption of the said plan and same is found to be advantageous to the City, most especially to the youth sector as it will promote the holistic development among the young people;

NOW THEREFORE, on motion of SP Member Joan Marbie C. Simbajon, Chairman, Committee on Youth & Sports Development, severally seconded by SP Members Roiland H. Villasencio, Gregorio G. Yrastorza III, Esteban V. Laurente, Eusebio Gerardo S. Penserga and Jasper M. Lucero; be it

RESOLVED, AS IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, to pass A RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE ORMOC CITY YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PLAN 2022-2024 AND INTEGRATING THE SAME TO THE CURRENT CITY DEVELOPMENT PLAN;

ADOPTED, February 03, 2022.

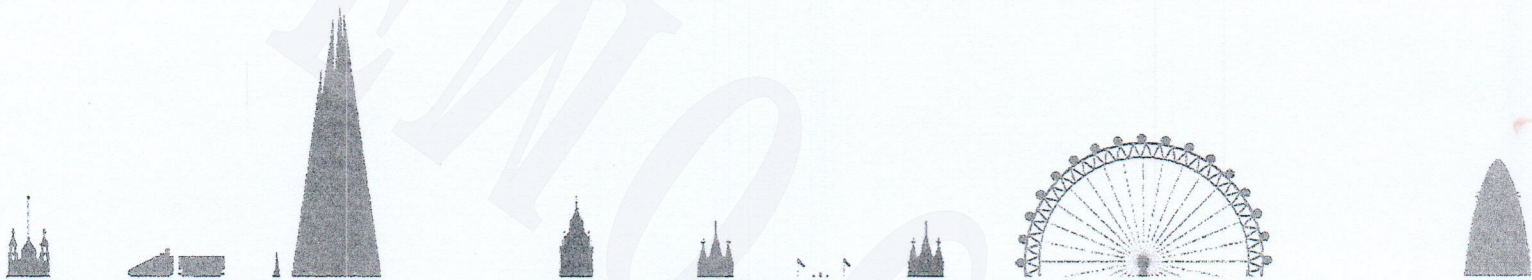

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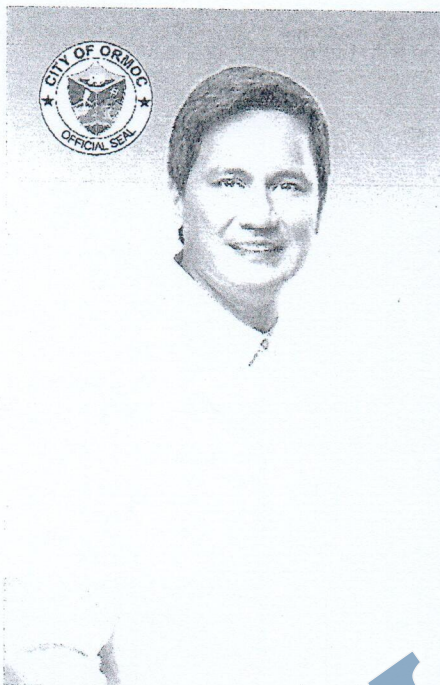
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Message from the City Mayor

Chapter I

INTRODUCTION

December 28, 2016, marks a remarkable milestone for the young people of Ormoc City. The Ordinance No. 015-2016 otherwise known as the "Ordinance establishing the Ormoc City Youth Development Program, prescribing the composition of its policy and implementing structures and providing funds therefore" got a unanimous approval (10 votes) from the Sangguniang Panlungsod on its 3rd and final reading at the SP Session Hall.


On March 16, 2017, the City Youth Development Office was officially created under the City Mayor's Office. This office is responsible for carrying out the City Youth Development Program that will promote the total well-being among the young people and ensure holistic or balanced formation and development among the young people.

The City Youth Development Office shall implement programs that will respond to the concerns of the in-school youth, out-of-school youth, the working youth, and the youth with special needs, and also proactive enough to advance the welfare of the young people and empower them to effectively make life choices and decisions.

Since its establishment, CYDO has been mobilizing the existing youth groups and launched the Ormoc City Youth Organization Registration Program (OCYORP), a localized version of NYC's Youth Organization Registration Program (YORP). 16 youth organizations made it as pioneering city-registered youth organizations that are considered partners for its programs and activities especially in the absence of the Sangguniang Kabataan. Out of that 16 youth organizations are where the members of City Youth Development Council were selected from. This council was institutionalized on May 2017 through Executive Order No. 16-2017 issued by the city mayor.

The CYDP shall serve as a logical framework for a unified action among the youth and youth-serving groups, government, and non-government organizations in the pursuit of youth development in Ormoc City. It contains long-term programs to be carried out by the concerned local government agencies and partner non-government agencies to address the economic, social, cultural, civil and political rights of the youth.

This 3-year plan shall be anchored on the vision and principles of Philippine Youth Development Plan (PYDP) 2017-2022. The CYDP is expected to contribute to the strengthening of our collective vision for the Ormocanon Youth: "Capacitated, Involved, and Productive Youth realizing their aspirations."



Chapter II

SCOPE

The city of Ormoc is a first class and independent component city in the Province of Leyte. It is the first non-provincial chartered city in the Philippines by virtue of Republic Act 179 of 1947 and by virtue of Presidential Proclamation No. 42. Ormoc celebrates its Charter Day every 20th day of October. The city is a major jump-off point and port of entry for neighboring islands in central Visayas and some parts of northern Mindanao. Its name is derived from “ogmok” an old Visayan term which means a depressed bowl.

According to the 2015 census, Ormoc has a population of 215,031 people. It is the economic, cultural, commercial and transportation hub of western Leyte. As an independent component city, it is excluded from the administrative regulation of the Provincial Government of Leyte and it cannot vote for Provincial Officials. However, the city is part of the Fourth Congressional District of Leyte along with the Municipalities of Albura, Kananga, Merida, Palompon and Isabel.

The Youth in Nation-Building Act (1994) defines a Filipino youth as those belonging to the age cohort 15–30 years old. The Filipino youth is classified as Child youth (15–17 years old), Core youth (18–24 years old), and Young Adult (25–30 years old).

This plan is intended to improve the lives of over 30,000 youth of Ormoc City also referred to as “Ormocanon Youth” whose population can be disintegrated as follows:

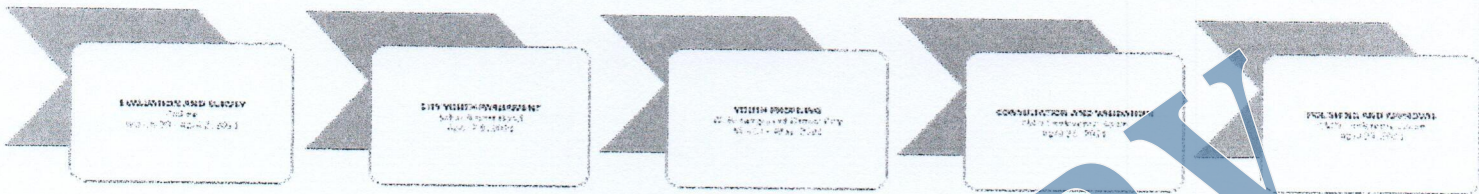


Chart 1. CYDP Formulation Methodology

- ✓ Strengthen youth participation in responsible sexual and reproductive health; and

- ✓ Increase and improve youth participation in education especially the out-of-school youth; and
- ✓ Provide non-academic educational opportunities such as skills enhancement, et al;

3. GOVERNANCE

- ✓ Strengthen productive collaboration between Sangguniang Kabataan (SK) and Youth Organizations;
- ✓ Promote youth participation in government and bureaucracy by enhancing governance and leadership skills; and
- ✓ Provide personal development opportunities that would develop their skills in representation and participation in governance

4. ACTIVE CITIZENSHIP

- ✓ Strengthen enabling mechanisms for youth organization and their participation;
- ✓ Develop individual and group interests and inculcate volunteerism through the academe and community engagement.
- ✓ Provide opportunities to the youth to enhance their essential life skills.

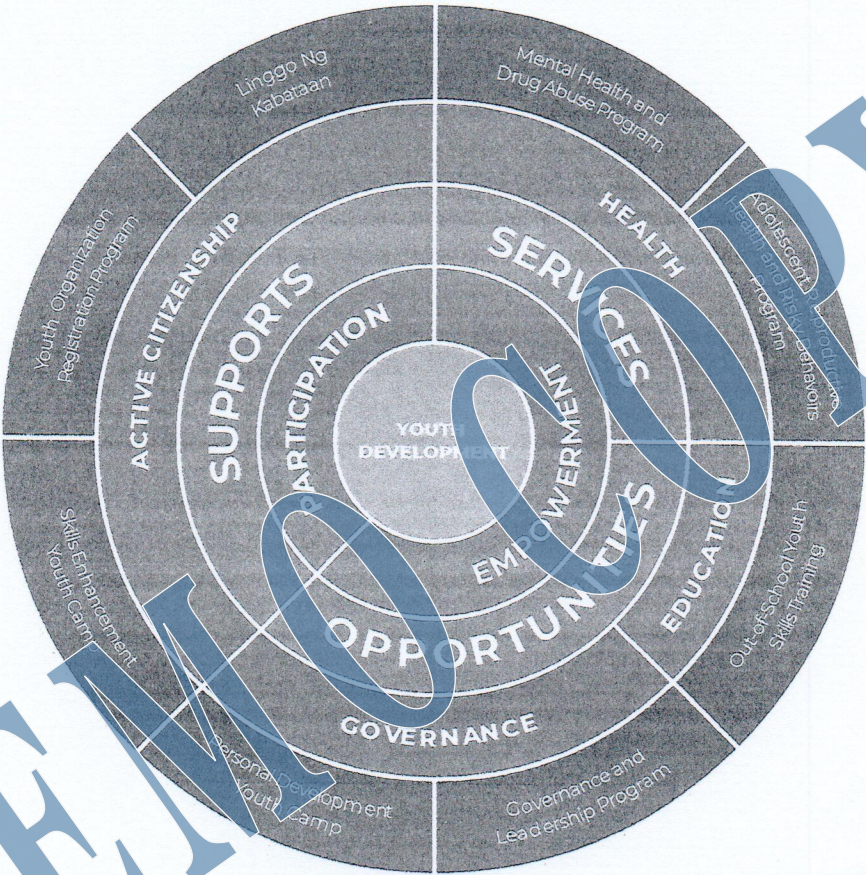


Chart 2. Ormoc Youth Agenda for years 2022-2024

These 4 agenda shall also be the priority areas where the Comprehensive Youth Development Plan (CBYDP) of all the barangays in Ormoc City will be anchored upon, as Section 8 of the SK Reform Act (RA10742) provides:

“SEC. 8. Powers and Functions of the Sangguniang Kabataan. – The Sangguniang Kabataan shall:

- (a) In consultation and with the concurrence of the Katipunan ng Kabataan, and within three (3) months from assumption to office, formulate a three (3)-year rolling plan, which shall be known as the Comprehensive Barangay Youth Development Plan, which shall serve as basis in the preparation of the Annual Barangay Youth Investment Program. This plan shall be aligned with the Philippine Youth Development Plan (PYDP) and other Local Youth Development Plans in every level, municipal, city and provincial as is relevant;”*



HEALTH

Issues:

Prevalence of teenage pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases such as HIV, and mental health issues such as depression and anxiety, as well as participation in drug abuse and risky behaviors.

Objective:

To ensure youth participation in healthy living especially in the prevention of early pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, promotion of good mental health among the youth, and avoidance of drug abuse and other risky behaviors.
